A highlight of the year was the development and implementation of a piratethemed curriculum used in programs on land and at sea. Thirty-one teachers enjoyed day-sails on *Alrischa*, while three others participated in a three-day workshop at the Ram Island Light Station.

SPONSORED THREE WEEKS OF "PIRATE CAMP" ON BURNT ISLAND

- Enrolled 75 campers within 48 hours of posting
- Planned to double the spaces in 2025 to meet the demand
- Trained four local teachers serving as camp instructors
- Developed pirate curriculum using STEM activities (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math)
- Paid fee for campers to stay overnight on Burnt Island



TEACHER DAY-SAILS & WORKSHOP

- Introduced Pirates of Mid-Coast Maine into the sailing program and overnight workshop on Ram Island
- Thirty-one participated in the day-sailing program
- Three teachers enrolled in a three-day workshop for recertification credits
- Learned about the Gulf of Maine and early explorers
- Pirate themed STEM activities included: maps, hat, spyglass, compass, cannon, boat, flag and pole
- Returned to classroom with renewed energy and fresh ideas of ways to introduce new lessons
